Summer Stephan-Chief Deputy District Attorney, San Diego County

Summer Stephan has served as a Deputy District Attorney in San Diego County for 27 years, rising through the ranks to appointments as Chief of the DA's North County Branch and Chief of the Sex Crimes and Human Trafficking Division, which are special victim units that she pioneered. In 2012, she was appointed Chief Deputy District Attorney.

As a trial prosecutor, Ms. Stephan tried more than 100 jury trials, including special circumstance, homicides, sexually violent predators, child molestation, sexual assault, child abuse, school shooting, assault on peace officers, and human trafficking-related cases.

Chief Deputy DA Summer Stephan holds leadership positions in public safety on the national state and local level. She serves as Chair of the County of San Diego Human Trafficking and Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children Advisory Council. Summer Co-Chairs the California District Attorneys Association Human Trafficking Committee and chairs the Women Prosecutors of the National District Attorneys Association, Human Trafficking Committee.



Danny Santiago Special Agent Supervisor/Task Force Commander California Department of Justice-Bureau of Investigation San Diego Human Trafficking Task Force

Danny Santiago has been a law enforcement officer for over 30 years. He is a Special Agent Supervisor with the California Department of Justice and is assigned as the Task Force Commander (TFC) of the San Diego Human Trafficking Task Force (SDHTTF). The SDHTTF is comprised of federal, state and local law enforcement agencies from throughout San Diego County. Commander Santiago oversees two supervisors, fourteen investigators and three analysts tasked with investigating cases of labor and sex trafficking in San Diego County.



Charisma De Los Reyes, MSW is a Policy Analyst & Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children (CSEC) Program Coordinator for Child Welfare Services. She has over 10 years of social services experience in investigations, family preservation and engagement, placement and congregate care as well as community child maltreatment prevention projects.



Dr. Jamie Gates, cultural anthropologist, and director of Point Loma Nazarene University's Center for Justice and Reconciliation, co-lead the groundbreaking research project "Measuring the Extent and Nature of Gang Involvement in Sex Trafficking in the San Diego/Tijuana Border Region" (2013-16). He co-chairs the Research and Data Committee of the San Diego County Advisory Council on Human Trafficking and CSEC. He founded and directs the Human Trafficking Research and Data Advisory Roundtable (HT-RADAR) for SD County.

He leads an effort to design and implement kNOW MORE, a drama-based peer-to-peer human trafficking awareness training in San Diego's middle and high schools. He serves as expert witness on human trafficking legislation. He also serves as faith-based organizer with regional and national faith-based organizations.

Tom Jones -Photo unavailable

My name is Tom Jones. I was molested at age six and then sex trafficked until age 15 and briefly prostituted in my mid-20s. After processing the trauma and impact of my own exploitation, I founded The H.O.P.E. Project (Healing, Outreach and Peer Empowerment) to create an open and safe space for men to talk about being sexually exploited and work through deep feelings of shame and secrecy to be able to begin healing. In addition to this, I am actively engaged in the effort to reduce the demand sex trafficking and prostitution activities as well as combatting the Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children (CSEC).

Ebony Jones-Photo Unavailable Ebony Jones is a survivor of sex trafficking and prostitution. She grew up in a home with domestic violence and alcoholism, her mother herself having survived drug addiction and prostitution, Ms. Jones was sexually and physically abused as a child and eventually placed in foster care for short periods of time. She never knew that her families unaddressed trauma and mental health would directly affect her own life in such a major way which led her into a life of prostitution and trafficking.
